Managing Trustee's Message

It is my honour to present the Patel Foundation-Patel Hospital's operational and financial report together with audited financial statements for the year ended 30th June 2022 and auditors report thereon.

In the face of uncertainty and challenging situations, Patel Hospital overcame obstacles and was successfully able to conduct its services. The hospital has continued to deliver a smooth flow of operations to fulfill its foundational principal of providing the finest of health care services to all fragments of society.

Since the past two years the pandemic's impact was knocking on the door, affecting day to day practices. However, this year a pivot back to pre-pandemic times was noticed as things returned to normalcy. Despite such external factors, Patel hospital continued to flourish by prioritizing our patients' needs.

Following below are presented statistics of medical services provided by the hospital during fiscal year 2021-2022 in comparison to the past year 2020-2021 displayed below in the table.

During the year ended 30th June 2022 an increase in revenue was reported by Rs. 301.260 million displaying 19% growth over the previous year, primarily because of a higher patient volume due to a rise in brand awareness amongst the common household. Just like the previous year, our institute has again posted the highest ever revenue incurred during the fiscal year 2021-2022 since the inauguration of our organization.

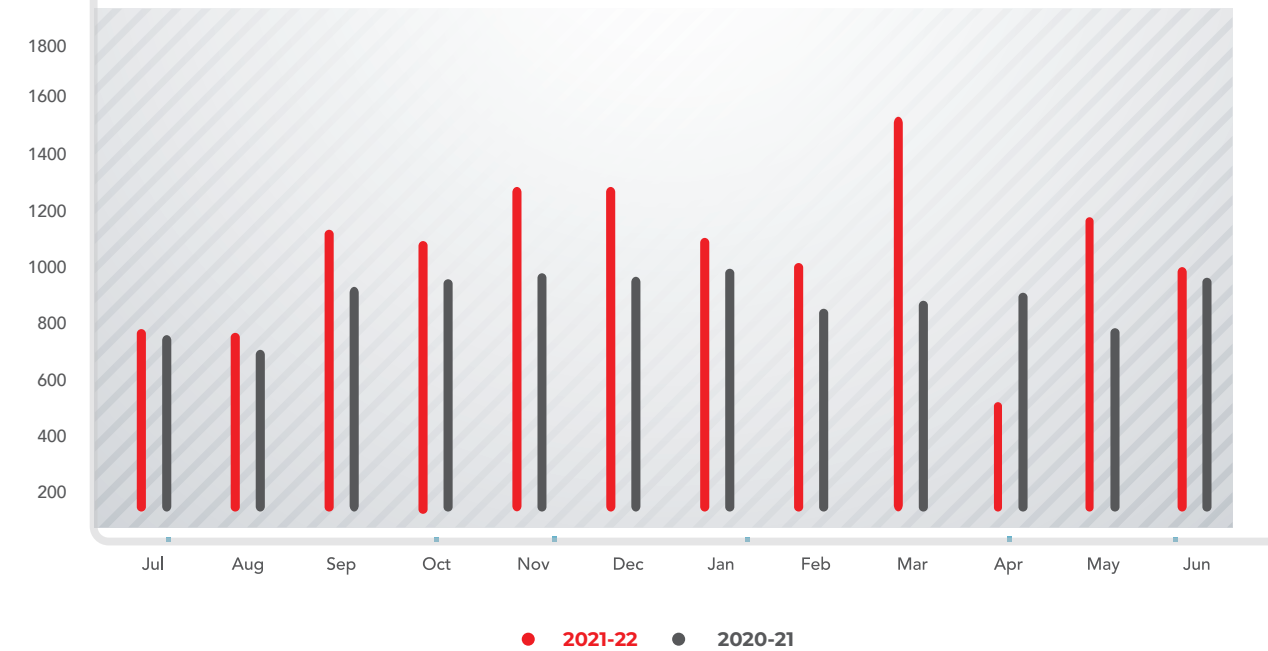

Our Services & Facilities

AUDIOLOGY:

The Department of Audiology provides services five days a week from 11:00 am to 5:00 pm, under the supervision of a specialized technicians. The team caters to a variety of services offered under the umbrella of the Audiology Department that include Hearing Assessment, Speech Discrimination, and Pure Tone Audiometry.



BURNS UNIT:

We provide Burn Care for people of all ages i.e., from infant to old. The Burn's team has dedicated qualified and experienced plastic and burn surgeons, that offer patients the best variety of care. Treatment of Burns is basically a teamwork and comprises of highly professional skills and dedication. Our services are functional 24/7, with our 10 bedded Burns ICU, our well-equipped Burns OT and exclusive step-down unit for Burn patients. We are dealing with Acute Burns as well as Burn complications from all parts of the country.



CENTRAL STERILE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT (CSSD):

Highly focused on consistent workflow maintenance which includes: Decontamination, Assembling and Packing, Autoclaving, Sterile Storage, and Distribution. All these processes are completed in accordance with our quality standards. Internships are also provided to the upcoming and young professionals in this department.



RADIOLOGY SERVICES:

Our Radiology services include General and Special Radiography, Fluoroscopy, Ultrasound Color Doppler, CT Scan, Interventional Radiology (Vascular and Non-Vascular Intervention), OPG, Mammography, Ultrasound, and CT guided procedures. All X-Rays are performed on our CR and DR System which is beneficial for lessening patients' wait time, radiation dose, and simultaneous viewing of images by multiple users in the Hospital (PACS System). Tests are being provided by qualified personnel in accordance with ISO standards.



EMERGENCY SERVICES 24/7:

Patel Hospital Emergency service has a capacity of 17 beds, supported by professional and skilled Medical and Paramedical staff. Our services are operational round the clock to cater all the emergency requirements of patients. The department is fully equipped for treating critical patients, has the facility and expertise of Intubation and Resuscitation. In order to raise the effectiveness of rescue efforts a well-defined emergency management system has been established which includes enhanced first aid on the site and upgraded overall coordination amongst the staff of the hospital involved in coping with emergency conditions.





NUTRITION AND DIET CONTROL:

Nutrition Department is also working under the supervision of the Food Service Department (FSD) that covers both In-Patient and Out-Patient services. They provide Dietary Care, Clinical Dietician Designed Food, according to their therapeutic needs in order to optimize their health. They also conduct Outpatient consultation clinics and give nutrition plans for Weight Management and other diseases.



GYNAE ENDOSCOPY FACILITY:

The Department of Obstetrics & Gynae Endoscopy is a teaching unit. It offers premium care to patients under the best Gynaecologist & Obstetrician. The Department has a well-established hygienic patient care setup, which is being monitored regularly. The Department is managing emergencies 24/7 & provides Emergency Obstetrics & Gynae Services. Gynae Endoscopy Department provides treatment for General Gynaecology, Gynae Laparoscopic Surgery. Guidance about birth control is also being provided by the infertility services.



OPERATION THEATRES:

Patel Hospital has four Operation Theatres comprising of three main and one minor operation room. The facility has a post-anesthesia care unit (PACU) as well as a well-equipped in house anesthesia and surgical cover service which is available 24/7.



OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT (OPD):

Patel Hospital provides 12 hours of OPD services starting from 9:00 am till 9:00 pm evening. Our OPD consultants are recognized among the best doctors in the city providing quality healthcare services. We offer services for 31 specialities with almost 100 doctors giving their services to the ailing humanity, supported by experienced and trained staff. Our OPD provides a comprehensive range of medical and surgical specialities for both adults and paediatric patients.



EXECUTIVE AND VIP ROOMS:

These rooms are designed to take care of your comfort with features like a separate attendant's area (only available in Executive Rooms), separate kitchen (only available in Executive Rooms), LED T.V, couches, attached bathroom, and a wardrobe facility. They are designed specifically to maintain the patient's ease and comfort, and also provide a high-class and positive ambiance that can help speed up their recovery. Furthermore, these rooms aim to facilitate the patient's family and their loved ones.



PHARMACY 24 HOURS:

24/7 In-Patient services given to both associate and corporate patients, covering the entire Hospital supported by a complete online system and a backup of a fully functional pharmacy. Main pharmacy function comprises of Clinical Pharmacy and Sterile Compounding Pharmacy Services.



EYE DIAGNOSTIC SERVICES:

The Department offers advanced equipment to help evaluate and also access the diseases that affect the human eye. The team offers comprehensive care and treatment for patients of all Eye-Related Diseases, in addition to expert consultation, accurate and early diagnosis, and management of various problems affecting the eyes. Eye Diagnostic services include OCT, FFA, ICGA, Angiography, Fundus Photography, Visual Field, Pachymeter, and B-Scan for all Eye-Related Diseases.



PHYSIOTHERAPY AND REHAB:

The Department comprises experienced and qualified Physiotherapists with the support of four internees' providing relief to those who arrive at our Hospital with pain and entangled mobility. The Department's personnel is highly trained to work with the latest modalities and hands-on techniques in order to restore function or minimize dysfunction after disease or injury.



THE DIAGNOSTIC LABORATORY:

The Diagnostic Laboratory Department is ISO 9001:2015 certified and internationally recognized with the external quality assurance of RIQAS. We also actively participate in the College of American Pathology (CAP) proficiency testing programs and achieving successful results in round the year cycles of standard testing evaluation. Highly qualified faculty and skilled technical staff are engaged in providing comprehensive Hematology, Microbiology, Clinical and Special Chemistry, Molecular Biology, Histopathology & Cytopathology; and Blood Banking diagnostic services.



CLINICAL LABORATORY:

Clinical Laboratory offers 24/7 services that cater to the needs of In-Patients, Out-Patients, and outside referrals by providing the best possible and modern diagnostic facilities at Patel Hospital. Our Clinical Laboratory Scientists perform a variety of laboratory test validation processes, ensure the quality of the test results. Their innovative approach led them towards evaluation & adaptation of newly introduced international methods for making the testing procedures more effective.



INTENSIVE CARE UNIT:

A purposely built ICU with the capacity of 14 beds and 10 ventilators, where both medical and surgical patients are catered to. We are giving comprehensive care to critical patients based on Advanced Diagnostic Technology and Standard Protocol Treatment according to the updated guidelines, and ensuring almost 100% recovery rate of Free Flap (Plastic Surgery) patients.



SPEECH THERAPY CLINIC:

Patel Hospital has a dedicated speech therapist who conducts clinics. We provide the facilities for treating children with Grammatical Problems, Dysarthria, Speech, and Communication Disorders. Patel Hospital Cochlear Implant and Cleft Palate patient had made good progress in speech and showed Phonological Awareness Skill and Literacy Development Skill at an age-appropriate level. However, a small number of children had Phonological Awareness and Literacy Delay.



ISOLATION WARD:

Patel Hospital has always strived to serve humanity by providing the best healthcare facilities to the masses without any discrimination. Following the current need, we are pleased to initiate an isolation ward facility for COVID-19 patients where all COVID-19 positive patients shall be retained and provided with the best quality care and treatment as per WHO standards with a negative pressure facility. This will help us in ensuring the safety of other patients from the virus spread.



CORONARY CARE UNIT:

Our Coronary Care Department is the center of excellence in complete Cardiac Care. It is our dedicated unit for the provision of 24/7 comprehensive diagnostic and therapeutic care for cardiac patients. It's a 6-bedded facility, with ECG, CPAP, and BIPAP facilities and renowned Cardiologists, Cardiothoracic Surgeons, Interventional, and Anesthesiologists. On-call doctors are always available inside the unit for thorough care of our patients.



PATEL INSTITUTE OF NURSING AND ALLIED HEALTH SCIENCES (PINAHS):

One of the proud pillars of Patel Hospital is the Patel Institute of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences (PINAHS) that aims to widen the expertise of its staff and help them acquire better opportunities in their career. In order to achieve it, PINAHS offers courses ranging from technician level to post-graduation. This is to expand the knowledge of our healthcare staff so they can become a wholesome and more valuable asset for the hospital, and can get fully groomed in their respective fields. Furthermore, additional facilities are provided including a library, skill lab, and computer lab, etc. for a more comprehensive learning experience.

This is a story about persistence and perseverance. We delivered a triplet 7 weeks earlier which had trouble breathing, slow reflexes, and poor activity in them. They weighed just 1500, 1100, 1100 grams, but we had hopes to see them bloom.

Surfactant, b CPAP, ionotropic supports, transfusions, antibiotics, labs, and radiograph – every mode of intervention was available at our disposal.

Every other day few dreams built up and few get shattered. Two of them were fighting like warriors but the third one was struggling for survival.

After facing many ups and down, the 1st one was finally ready for mother care on their 16th day of life, 2nd baby was enduring tube feeding, but the third one was still in hot waters.

She developed sepsis, we were losing heart, but third day saw an uptick in cultures uplifting our spirits again. We got same targets, antibiotics reviewed, supports escalated, and finally she made it. Almighty answered our efforts and her Parents prayers. She went home on 29th day of life.

The three little girls are on follow up, achieving milestones and meeting developmental challenges which is nothing less than a miracle.

Marium - Success Story

Together making a difference

The most important feeling of a mother to-be, is the moving and kicking of her baby as a hint of life growing inside her.

Marium, the mother of our preemie baby girl, didn't feel any movements at 30 weeks of gestation and rushed to hospital where ultrasound scan showed severe intrauterine growth retardation.

Doctors decided to deliver the baby via emergency C-section. She was born weighing just 900gm carrying all the perks of prematurity.

Receiving all the supportive treatment she made through the 1st three hardest days of life, struggling and fighting against all odds.

She showed improvement every day, accepting all the challenges, confronting all the difficulties bravely.

On 11th day of her life, her supports were tapered and were given trial oral feed.

After 9 more days of care she was discharged and sent home on 21st day of life on room air and on mother feed. Now, she is an eleven month old adorable girl, embracing all the joys with her Parents.

Shaheen - Success story (Plastic/Burns)

Spreading kindness

Master Syed Fariz, a 4 years old child suffered from fire burn 4 months ago, severely affecting his face and upper limbs. He was initially managed with first aid at a local clinic. He then presented to Patel Hospital with post burn deformities.

He had developed a contracture of left hand and hypertrophic scar of left side of face because of which he was unable to close his left eye and was developing exposure keratitis with constant eye watering.

With our timely intervention, the child was able to use his left hand for all the basic functions like grasping objects. Moreover, exposed left eye has now been saved from complications like visual defects or blindness.

From this story, we realize the efforts of our team to give back a life as close to normal for this child so he may not face any psychological & social problems in future. At the same time, we advocate and hope that domestic awareness will increase so that in future, such accidents with severe burn injuries can be decreased significantly.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Trustees

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Patel Foundation (Patel Hospital), which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2022, and the statement of comprehensive income and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Patel Foundation (Patel Hospital) as at June 30, 2022, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with approved accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan as mentioned in note 2.2.

Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as applicable in Pakistan. Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the financial statement

The Patel Foundation (Patel Hospital) is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with approved accounting standards applicable in Pakistan, and for such internal control as the foundation determines is necessary to enable the presentation of the preparation of the financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, trustees are responsible for assessing the Patel Foundation (Patel Hospital) ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the trust or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Trust's financial reporting process.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statement

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Notes To The Financial Statements For The Year Ended June 30, 2022

1. Nature and status of business

Patel hospital (herein after referred as "Hospital"), was established in Karachi, Pakistan on 24th November 1999 under the repealed Trust Act, 1882 (repealed with the enactment of Sindh Trust Act, 2020) as a trust. The principal business activity of the hospital is to provide quality medical and healthcare facilities at affordable charges.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

2.1. Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the "historical cost convention".

2.2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have also been prepared in accordance with "Guideline for accounting and reporting for Non-Government (NGOs) and Non-Profit Organisations (NPOs)" issued by ICAP.

2.3. Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the requirements of approved accounting standards as applicable in Pakistan requires management to make judgments, estimates and associated assumptions that affect the application of policies and the reported amounts of assets & liabilities and income & expenses. The judgments estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the result of which form the basis of making judgments about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on periodic basis. Revision to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Judgments made by management in the application of approved accounting standards, as applicable in Pakistan, that have significant effect on the financial statements and estimates with a significant risk of material adjustments in the future years are as follows:

- determining the residual values, useful lives and pattern of flow of economic benefits of property, plant and equipment;
- Impairment of financial assets;

Other areas, if any, where estimates and judgments involved are disclosed in respective notes to the financial statements.

2.4. Property, plant & equipment

2.4.1. Owned assets

Property plant & equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation value except for freehold land, which is stated at cost. Depreciation is charged to profit and loss account by applying the reducing balance method at the rates specified in the property plant & equipment note.

Depreciation on additions during the year is charged from the month the asset is available for use while depreciation on disposal is charged up to the preceding month of disposal.

Normal repairs and maintenance are charged to profit and loss account as and when incurred. Major renewals and improvements are capitalized.

Gain or loss on disposal of property plant & equipment is recognized in the period of disposal.

2.4.2. Leased assets

Leased assets are stated at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of minimum lease payments at the inception of the lease, less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any.

2.5. Intangible assets

Intangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. The depreciable amount of intangible asset is amortized on a systematic basis over the estimated useful lives using the reducing balance method.

2.6. Impairment of assets

At each balance sheet date, the hospital reviews the carrying amounts of its assets for indications of impairment loss. If the recoverable amount of an asset or cash generating unit is estimated to be less than the carrying value, the carrying value of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized as an expense immediately.

2.7. Stock in trade

These are valued at lower of cost and net realizable value applying the weighted average cost.

Stock-in-transit is stated at invoice value plus other charges paid there, on to the balance sheet date.

Net realizable value signifies the selling prices prevailing in the market, less selling expenses incidental to sale.

2.8. Trade debts

Trade receivables are carried at the original invoice amount. Bad debts are written off when identified.

2.9. Taxation

Current

The foundation has been approved as a non-profit organization under clause 2(36) of the second schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance 2001 vide letter # CIT/COS-V/2007/358 dated 11-07-2006.

Further, under clause 11(A) (IX) of part IV of Second Schedule to the Income Tax Ordinance 2001, Foundation being a non-profit Organization approved under clause 36 of Section 2 of the Income tax Ordinance is also exempt from minimum tax.

2.10. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, balances with treasury banks and balances with other banks in current and deposit accounts.

2.11. Financial instruments

All financial assets and liabilities are recognized at the time when the firm becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Any gain or loss on de-recognition of the financial assets and financial liabilities are included in the net profit / loss for the period in which it arises.

2.12. Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted in Pak rupees at the rates of exchange prevailing on transaction date. Any exchange gains and losses are recognized in the profit and loss account.

2.13. Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the firm has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate of that amount can be made.

2.14. Zakat & donations

Zakat that is received or becomes receivable are recognized in the Fund Account during the period in which these are received or become receivable and utilized strictly in accordance with Shariah.

Hospital receives "Donations" from its Associates and Well-wishers for a particular project or for purchase of specific equipment required in any department. These donations are recognized as donated capital in Fund Account. These "Donations" are not utilized to meet hospital's operational expenses.

Where receipts are in excess of the actual expenses or vice-e-versa, the balance is carried forward as fund balance.

2.15. Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized when it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the hospital and the amount of revenue and the associated cost incurred or to be incurred can be measured reliably.

- Clinical, cafeteria and nursing school's income are recognized at the time when services are rendered;
- Sale of goods is recognized when the goods are delivered and the risks and rewards of ownership have passed to the customer.
