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WORLD HEPATITIS DAY:

RAISING AWARENESS, PROMOTING PREVENTION, AND SAVING LIVES

World Hepatitis Day is observed annually on July 28 to highlight the impact of hepatitis on the liver. It includes types A, B, C, D, and E, presenting unique challenges. Globally, an estimated 325 million people are living with chronic hepatitis B or C, and it results in over 1.1 million deaths annually worldwide. In Pakistan, about 5% of the population suffers from hepatitis B, and roughly 3% from hepatitis C. The prevalence reflects critical gaps in prevention, screening, and treatment services, especially in low- and middle-income countries.

HEPATITIS A

Hepatitis A is a significant concern in Pakistan, primarily due to poor sanitation and water quality. The disease has a high incidence rate with periodic outbreaks, especially affecting younger populations in areas with inadequate hygiene. Screening for Hepatitis A typically involves serological tests to detect antibodies. Common symptoms include jaundice, abdominal pain, fatigue, and nausea. Although the disease is generally self-limiting, effective management of outbreaks remains crucial. Vaccination stands as the most effective preventive measure, while improved sanitation, safe food handling, and access to clean water are also essential in reducing the incidence of Hepatitis A.

HEPATITIS B

Hepatitis B is a significant health issue in Pakistan, affecting approximately 5% of the population. High transmission rates are primarily due to unsafe medical practices, mother-to-child transmission, and insufficient vaccination coverage. Screening for Hepatitis B involves blood tests to detect surface antigens and antibodies. The disease can present with acute or chronic symptoms, though it is often asymptomatic, underscoring the importance of widespread screening. Vaccination is highly effective in preventing Hepatitis B, while ensuring the safety of medical practices and screening of blood products are also crucial in reducing transmission.

HEPATITIS C

Pakistan has one of the highest rates of Hepatitis C globally, affecting about 3% of the population. The disease is often spread through unsafe medical procedures and the sharing of needles among drug users. Screening for Hepatitis C involves blood tests for antibodies and viral RNA. Symptoms can range from mild to severe, including jaundice and abdominal discomfort, with chronic infections potentially leading to cirrhosis and liver cancer if left untreated. Prevention efforts focus on ensuring the safety of medical procedures, using sterilized equipment, and screening blood products, while harm reduction strategies like needle exchange programs are also effective in reducing transmission.

HEPATITIS D

In Pakistan, Hepatitis D occurs only in individuals already infected with Hepatitis B, making co-infection a concern in areas with a high burden of Hepatitis B. Screening for Hepatitis D involves testing for antibodies and the virus, and symptoms can be more severe in cases of co-infection. Prevention of Hepatitis D is closely tied to controlling Hepatitis B through vaccination and safe medical practices. Effective management of Hepatitis B significantly reduces the risk of Hepatitis D.

HEPATITIS E

Hepatitis E, similar to Hepatitis A, is transmitted through contaminated food and water, and in Pakistan, the incidence is significant, particularly during outbreaks linked to poor sanitation and contaminated water sources. Screening for Hepatitis E involves serological tests to detect antibodies, with symptoms including jaundice, abdominal pain, and fever. While the virus is usually self-limiting, it can be severe in pregnant women. Preventive measures focus on ensuring access to clean water, proper sanitation, and improving hygiene practices and public health infrastructure to prevent Hepatitis E outbreaks.

GENERAL AWARENESS AND CONCLUSION

Raising awareness about hepatitis is vital for reducing its burden. Education on transmission, symptoms, and prevention empowers communities to take action. World Hepatitis Day highlights the global and local challenges of hepatitis, emphasizing the need for ongoing prevention, screening, and treatment efforts.

INSIGHT REPORT

W.H.O. HEPATITIS: GLOBAL IMPACT AND REGIONAL STRATEGIES

According to the WHO, an estimated 4.5 million premature deaths from Hepatitis could be prevented in low- and middle-income countries by 2030 through vaccination, diagnostic tests, medicines, and education campaigns.

GLOBAL IMPACT AND PUBLIC HEALTH CHALLENGE

- Morbidity and Mortality: According to WHO, viral hepatitis is responsible for 1.1 million deaths each year, making it one of the leading causes of death worldwide. Most deaths are due to complications such as cirrhosis and liver cancer.
- Regional Variations: The burden of hepatitis varies significantly across regions, with the highest prevalence in low- and middle-income countries.
- Economic Burden: The financial impact of hepatitis is substantial, encompassing direct medical costs, loss of productivity, and long-term healthcare for chronic liver diseases.

HEPATITIS IN ASIA: A REGIONAL FOCUS:

Asia, particularly East, and Southeast Asia faces a significant burden of hepatitis, especially Hepatitis B and C. Here's an in-depth look at the region:

Hepatitis B Poses a significant health challenge in Asia, with the highest prevalence globally. Countries such as China, India, Indonesia, and the Philippines report some of the highest rates of chronic Hepatitis B infection, with prevalence in East Asia approaching 6% and in certain countries as high as 10%. The primary transmission mode in this region is vertical transmission, where the virus is passed from mother to child during childbirth. Unsafe medical practices and blood transfusions also contribute to the spread.

Hepatitis C is also prevalent in Asia, particularly in countries like Pakistan, India, and Egypt. Pakistan has one of the highest prevalence rates globally, around 4.8%. Unsafe medical practices, including the reuse of needles and the use of contaminated blood products, are major sources of transmission.

Hepatitis E presents a major public health issue in South Asia, notably in countries such as India, Bangladesh, and Nepal. The disease is often linked to outbreaks caused by contaminated water supplies.

PUBLIC HEALTH CHALLENGES:

- Access to Healthcare: In many parts of Asia, access to healthcare is limited, particularly in rural areas. This hampers efforts to screen for, diagnose, and treat hepatitis effectively.
- Awareness and Education: Public awareness about hepatitis remains low in many Asian countries, leading to underdiagnosis and a lack of preventive measures.
- Stigma: Social stigma associated with hepatitis can prevent people from seeking testing and treatment, further exacerbating the spread of the disease.

MITIGATION AND MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES

- Vaccination Programs: The WHO supports universal vaccination, particularly for Hepatitis B, which has significantly lowered incidence rates in many countries, including those in Asia.
- Screening and Treatment: WHO guidelines stress the importance of early screening for Hepatitis B and C to facilitate early diagnosis and treatment. Effective antiviral therapies can manage the virus and mitigate liver damage.
- Public Health Initiatives: The WHO's Global Health Sector Strategy aims to eliminate hepatitis by 2030, targeting a 90% reduction in new infections and a 65% reduction in deaths.
- Community Engagement and Education: Raising awareness about hepatitis transmission and prevention through education campaigns and outreach is crucial to reducing stigma and promoting testing and vaccination.

CURRENT RESEARCH AND FUTURE DIRECTIONS:

Research is ongoing to develop vaccines for Hepatitis C and to enhance the availability of the Hepatitis E vaccine. New antiviral treatments are being developed to improve efficacy and accessibility, particularly in low-income regions. Global efforts are focused on strengthening health systems, improving surveillance, and expanding access to care and treatment.
